

Glenda Blum Minkin is a development consultant with broad experience in the areas of not-for-profit development and political fundraising.

Minkin has created development departments within not-for-profits, that have included development of a major donor campaign; development of a Board campaign; strategic planning for cultivation of new donors; oversight of direct mail programs; oversight of foundation/grantmaking programs involving research and grant proposal development; and reporting processes for foundations.

Minkin's clients have included, among others, The Anti-Prejudice Consortium; The Names Project, AIDS Memorial Quilt; and The Weber School. In addition; Minkin has served as the fundraising coordinator for many candidates and elected officials at both the State and local level, including several at the beginning of their political careers. While coordinating the fundraising for the 1993 and 1997 City of Atlanta Mayoral campaigns, Minkin oversaw the largest total amounts raised to those dates for a Mayoral campaign.

Minkin currently serves on the Board of Arms with Ethics, an organization dedicated to getting illegal guns off the streets and out of the hands of criminals. She is also working on an inaugural conference for women in engineering, construction and related services. Among Minkin's community leadership positions, she has served as the Alumni Program Chair for Leadership Atlanta, President of Brandeis University National Women's Committee, Atlanta Chapter, Campaign Chair of the Women's Division of the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta, and Co-Chair of the Annual Campaign of the Atlanta Women's Foundation. In addition, Minkin has served on many Boards, including the Atlanta Women's Foundation, Piedmont Park Conservancy, Atlanta Victim Assistance Program, the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta, Jewish Family and Children's Services, The Greenfield Hebrew Academy, The Doris and Alex Weber School, and the National Board of the Women's Division of the United Jewish Appeal. Minkin also served as a member of the Governor's Commission on Film and Video and on the Lieutenant Governor's Environmental Advisory Committee.

Minkin was a participant in the first Wexner Heritage Foundation Community Leadership Program in Atlanta. She received the Abe Schwartz Leadership Award from the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta in 1983 and is a graduate of Leadership Atlanta, Class of 2004.
